od is doing great things through the ministries of our international partners among children affected by poverty. Without adequate food, health-care, and opportunities for education, these **J** children have little hope of breaking the cycle of poverty. Covenant Kids is working with our international partners to break this cycle. This issue focuses on some of those programs and how you can become involved in helping children in Colombia, India, Congo, and Sudan.

Covenant Kids-**Love in Action**

early three billion people in the world live on less than \$2 a day, according to the World Bank Development Indicators. Many people lack education, clean water to drink, food to eat, medical care, clothing, jobs, even a safe place to live. Millions of children exist in these impoverished situations. UNICEF calculates that 25,000 children die each day due to poverty. How can we as the church respond to this overwhelming need?

Covenant Kids is a program for impoverished children, coordinated by Covenant World Mission with support from Covenant World Relief and Paul Carlson Partnership. It be-

gan in Colombia, but has expanded to include children in India, Congo, and Sudan. And for only \$25 a month, individual Covenanters can help give these children a hopeful future.

Colombia

In 1986 Covenant missionary Gwynne Lewis and Maria Salazar, a member of the Colombia Covenant Church, launched Covenant Kids as a way to support the children of Covenant pastors and leaders in the city

of Medellín. They began with fourteen sponsors helping fourteen children. The program quickly grew, and in 1992 Covenant Kids was recognized by the government, allowing it to expand even more.

Today Covenant Kids in Colombia remains a one-on-one sponsorship program, providing children education, nutrition, and medical care, and showing them God's love. In addition to the children of Medellín, it now serves children in other parts of central and northern Colombia.

The need is greater than ever as Colombia has one of





the world's highest internally displaced populations-second only to Sudan. Four decades of conflict has forced families from rural areas to seek safety in the cities.

Covenant Kids is working in partnership with Covenant churches in Colombia, many of which are in regions that include very poor neighborhoods of displaced families. The churches have established schools. as well as health, recreation, and spiritual formation programs for these children.

India

Hundreds of millions of people are impact-

ed by the grip of poverty as they face lack of consistent employment, debt, water-borne illnesses, and discrimination against the lower castes. Often children become laborers. Covenant Kids-India supports the work of three national church partners-India for Christ Ministries, Truthseekers, and the Hindustani Covenant Church-that are reaching out to children in need.

While the Indian constitution mandates public education for children through tenth grade, tens of millions of children from the lowest caste do not have opportunities

for an education. Without proper nutrition, health-care, and educational support, they struggle to attend or remain in school.

India for Christ Ministries' Child Development Centre is a non-formal education program, providing physical, educational, social, and spiritual support for needy children in and around Bangalore. The center cares for more than 600





children between the ages of three and fifteen. In the short term, the program seeks to address health issues, provide nutritious food, and teach Christian values. Long-term goals include developing a support system for the children and their families, providing education and career guidance, and helping the children grow spiritually. Individual scholarships provide opportunities for new children to join the program.

Truthseekers, another partner in India, developed a number of neighborhood schools dedicated to the education of otherwise forgotten boys and girls, ages three to twelve. Classes meet from August to April, providing basic schooling and one meal a day for 600 to 800 children. The schools meet in patios, courtyards, and simple dwellings; there are rarely desks, chalkboards, or school supplies. Parents of the children who attend are asked to pay about one dollar a month. While it does not cover the costs, it represents a real investment in their children's education as parents make between \$30 and \$60 a month.

The Hindustani Covenant Church (HCC), our third partner in India, has

churches and ministries across central India. This sister church has established programs to meet the needs of the poorest of the poor-those who do not have such basic amenities as sanitation, clean drinking water, electricity, medical care, even one meal a day. HCC employs social workers, medical professionals, teachers, and pastors to carry out these programs. They work among child labor-

ers in the slums of Mumbai, Pune, Solapur, and Gulbarga, including children who scavenge in dumps and whose parents work in the sex trade.

Congo

Covenant Kids–Congo supports the work of the Congo Covenant Church (CEUM) alongside Covenant partners Paul Carlson Partnership (PCP) and the Department of Women Ministries. The CEUM is involved in northwest

Congo in educational programs for children, youth, young adults, and women. These programs give younger participants a foundation for lifelong learning and older participants practical skills and job training.

Congolese families struggle to provide basic necessities and medical care. There is little available for education. The CEUM and PCP help support local village schools where funding is needed for the most basic supplies, including chalkboards, benches and desks, pens and paper.

A Covenant program provides technical training to young adults for a variety of trade services. Students typically participate for one year in order to develop tools necessary for their trade.

With funding from the Department of Women Ministries' Educate the Girls project, the CEUM

provides secondary education for girls who seek a high-school certificate. Scholarships now make it possible for young women to learn through the provision of teachers, curriculum, supplies, and building maintenance.

Sudan

Covenant Kids–Sudan supports the work of the Evangelical Covenant Church of Sudan (ECCS), which faces a myriad of issues relating to civil unrest, war, displacement of families, poverty, and disease. Covenant World Relief and Covenant World Mission partner with the ECCS to respond to these overwhelming needs through church leadership training, education, medical care, and community development projects.

The Good Hope Academy in Bentui is an ECCS school that provides education and a nutritious meal for children each day. Almost half the students at the academy are girls—a significant accomplishment in a country where only 18 percent of girls get an education. A \$25 Covenant Kids scholarship each month supports two children at

the academy.

Through both non-formal and formal education programs, lives are being changed in each of these countries. Ministry partners in North America can participate in these ministries by providing \$25 scholarships for children, teenagers, or young adults so they may participate in programs that address educational, social, physical, and spiritual needs. By working together with our international partners, we can help children break out of the cycle of poverty.

105 Baptized in Thailand

A total of 105 new believers in southern Thailand who are affected by HIV/AIDS were recently baptized in a single service by staff members of the Sustainable Development Research Foundation (SDRF). The foundation is directed by Covenant missionary Jim Gustafson.

"This was no ordinary baptism (service), which are usually solemn and quiet," says Covenant missionary Bob Shim. "Children frolicked in the ocean and people stood on the beach laughing and talking, but in the water where Jim and Khun Nujon were baptizing, it was a sacred place.

"What stood out most was the joy and hope on their faces. Some of the newly baptized even broke into dance after coming out of the water," Shim says.

"Here is a group of people who have lost jobs, been marginalized by their society, and shunned by their families—all because of their illness," he notes. "However, they felt completely accepted in this new community. Their love for one another is contagious."

This group of believers has steadily been growing over the last few years, now numbering more than 200 individuals located in various communities throughout southern Thailand.

Following the baptism on May 21, everyone gathered for communion and a Thai string-tying ceremony at the Center for HIV/AIDS Affected Communities.

Plans have been made to baptize seventy-five additional believers who were unable to attend due to the spread of a mosquito-borne viral disease that is epidemic in southern Thailand.
