artners in Transformation" is the new CWR tagline. CWR is blessed with phenomenal partners God is using to bring about the transformation of individuals, families, and communities. In order to strengthen and deepen these partnerships and to monitor CWR funded projects, our director, Dave Husby, tries to visit CWR partners every one to two years.

In September, Dave visited water, agricultural, and education projects with the Kenya Covenant Church. He also visited Jitokeze, a women's empowerment through agricultural development program in West Pokot.

Dave and Chrissy were with CWR's Latin American partners in Medellin, Colombia, this October. Each partner shared his or her expertise with the others. It was a wonderful time of mutual learning and deepening relationships.

In November, Dave visited Covenant pastors and Covenant related partners in New York City who are carrying out relief and recovery work after Superstorm Sandy. The extent of the destruction is disheartening, but it was very encouraging to see the quality of work being done by our partners.

Dave visited the CWR-funded human trafficking, clean water, microfinance, education, vocational training, and agricultural projects of the Hindustani Covenant Church this December. Dave also went to Truthseekers in Delhi and visited the CWR projects providing education for low caste and outcaste children. He also visited the program seeking to end caste

discrimination and providing caste reconciliation. While very different in their approach, both of these ministries are addressing root causes of poverty and injustice. It was encouraging to see the breadth, depth, and effectiveness of their work.

In January, Dave visited two projects with the Sustainable Development Research Foundation, one education program among Hill tribe people of northern Thailand, and the other among HIV impacted people in southern Thailand. Dave also visited a recycling business project for youth in the slums of Bangkok, and went to the border of Burma where CWR is partnering in providing medical relief and development among the Karen tribes who are suffering great persecution.

BIHAR—A BACKWARD STATE

any states in India are designated as "backward" states by the Indian government. These backward states are undeveloped and people suffer from poverty, a lack of education, and gender inequality. Bihar is a backward state. In fact, Bihar is the poorest state in all of India.

The Sitamarhi district of Bihar is the poorest region in the state,



with nearly 90 percent of the population living in extreme poverty. All but a very small minority of wealthy men face systemic oppression from gender inequality and the caste system. The climate and geography are such that they face numerous recurring floods. As an agricultural people, the systematic oppression and recurring disasters make life overwhelming. Many farmers have committed suicide.

Only 26 percent of women are literate. Health and education facilities are inaccessible. Recurring floods damage crops and steal the livelihood of most families. Inadequate sanitation and access to clean water create numerous health problems.

Our current project with the Hindustani Covenant Church empowers families so that they may provide for themselves. They are given a new perspective on life because they are able to rise up out of poverty. Would you join us in providing relief and transformation in this backward state?

More than 1 billion people around the world live on less than \$1 per day, and more than 2 billion people live on less than \$2 per day.

VISIBLE TRANSFORMATION

first met Sunita in November 2010 when she had just been rescued from the red light district in Pune, India, by the Hindustani Covenant Church (HCC). She had been sold to a brothel by a relative when she was fifteen years old. I met Sunita again on my visit to India earlier this month. What a change in countenance! She is still in the HCC rehabilitation program for former commercial sex workers, but is now participating in the communion wafer making business and mentoring women who have more recently been rescued. Amazing transformation!
