
Time with God—SPECK...


Time with God—Reporter...

Time with God—PROAPT...

This Bible reading method gives you cues for learning from the Scripture you're reading. When you use this Bible reading method during your time with God, first pray and ask God to teach you as you study his word. Then read a passage of Scripture.


Pray	Ask God to guide you as you read through the passage.
Read	Read the passage through twice—once quickly then once slowly.
Observe	Look carefully over the passage and take note of what you see, such as people, events, special circumstances, things that seem confusing or hard to understand, difficult words, actions that take place, and anything else that stands out to you. Ask yourself questions such as, "What is the author emphasizing?" and "What did the first hearers of this word think about it?"
Apply	Think about what you've read, and ask yourself how it might hold true for you. Ask yourself questions such as, "What does this passage say to me about my life?" "Can I identify with anything these characters have experienced? If so, what and how?" "Does this passage point to any changes I need to make in my life such as habits I need to drop or new attitudes I need to adopt? If so, what?"
Pray	As you think about your answers to the questions in the "Apply" section, ask God to help you make whatever changes you need to make. None of us can change alone; only by God's strength and power in our lives can we become the people he wants us to be. Invite him to do his work in your life.
Tell	Now that you've made some new discoveries about God and what he wants to do in your

Tell Now that you've made some new discoveries about God and what he wants to do in your life, tell someone. Share your new discoveries with a close friend, parent, or mentor, and ask that person to pray that God will work in you.

He laid back on his recliner and began to read the paper. His family headed out into the blustery night, leaving him at home.



In his frustration he looked up into the star lit sky and shouted, "What do I have to do for you to understand? You are all going to die! Do I have to become a bird to show you the way?"



READER TWO: God the magnificent had a plan. God prepared the way, then God made the move: from God the all-powerful to God the baby. And they named him Jesus.


READER ONE: Why God the baby? Why God the child? Why God the teenager? Why God the human?

READER ONE: Why?


READER THREE: "That's simple: because I want to, because I made them, because I love them."

Guest Appearance


My name is John. No last name, just John. Today you'll be learning about the day Jesus was baptized. I want to tell you my version of the story. It started before I was born. My father was Zechariah, a priest. An angel visited him, telling him I was coming. What a surprise! You see, my parents were both pretty old, well past the point they thought they would have children. The angel told my father that God was sending me to do a special job—to tell the people of Israel that the Messiah was coming.

Without any brothers or sisters, I grew up sort of alone. I like being on my own. Some people think I have strange habits. I like to think of them as unique. [John grabs some raisins, squirts a little honey on them, and pops them into his mouth.] Like eating these locusts—really quite tasty if you put a little honey on them.

When I grew older, God told me to preach to the people of Israel to repent of their sins and be baptized, so I did. I stirred up quite a bit of controversy because I told the people they were sinners and needed to repent. Then I told the religious leaders that they needed to repent as well.

They didn't know what to make of me. *[John smiles and pops another few locusts.]* Some of the leaders asked me if I was the Messiah they had been waiting for. I told them that I wasn't even close to that! I just came to get their attention so that when the Messiah did show up they would be ready for him.

Then God talked to me again and told me that the Messiah would soon come. I didn't know who the Messiah was, but God assured me that I would know him when I saw him. He told me that the Holy Spirit would come and land on the man. So I'm thinking, "Okay, I wonder what that's going to look like."






I just kept preaching and baptizing people, and then one day it happened! I was standing, waist-deep in the Jordan River with people all around, and Jesus appeared. He walked over to me. Now plenty of people needed to repent and be baptized, but I knew Jesus wasn't one of them! This guy was so good and kind and honest that he put me to shame.

"No way!" I told him. "I can't baptize you. You should baptize me!" But Jesus insisted. He said it was something we had to do because it was right. Well, Jesus stepped into the water, and I baptized him. And as he came out of the water, all of a sudden, out of nowhere the Spirit of God descended on Jesus like a dove. I wondered if this could be the sign I was looking for! My heart began to pound in my ears, and then I heard another sound—a voice coming from nowhere…and everywhere. It was a full and strong voice like I had never heard before, and it said, "This is my beloved Son, and I am fully pleased with him." [John starts to reach for another locust but stops because he is more interested in remembering.]

You know, that was the most awesome moment in my life. There in the Jordan River was God the Son, God the Father with the great voice, and God the Spirit as a dove. God was totally there, and God was saying, in effect, "Okay, Israel, your Messiah is here!" [John looks off in the distance with a glazed look for about five seconds.]





Temptation in the Wilderness...




Jesus Enters Jerusalem

Luke 19:28-40, 45-48 (adapted from the NIV)

- READER ONE: After Jesus had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. As he approached Bethphage and Bethany at the hill called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, **READER TWO:** "Go to the village ahead of you, and as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' tell him, 'The Lord needs it.'" READER THREE: Those who were sent ahead went and found it just as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them. **READER FOUR:** "Why are you untying the colt?" READERS FIVE and SIX: "The Lord needs it." READER THREE: They brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks on the colt and put Jesus on it. As he went along, people spread their cloaks on the road. READER ONE: When he came near the place where the road goes down the Mount of Olives, the whole crowd of disciples began joyfully to praise God in loud voices for all the miracles they had seen:
- ALL (except TWO): "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!" "Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!"

READER THREE:	Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Jesus,
READER FOUR:	"Teacher, rebuke your disciples!"
READER TWO:	"I tell you, if they keep quiet, the stones will cry out."
READER ONE:	Then he entered the Temple area and began driving out those who were selling.
READER TWO:	"It is written 'my house will be a house of prayer'; but you have made it 'a den of robbers."
READER THREE:	Every day he was teaching at the Temple.
READER ONE:	But the chief priests, the teachers of the law, and the leaders among the people were trying to kill him. Yet they could not find any way to do it, because all the people listened closely to his words.







Game Rules...

- Every group member rolls the die once. The player who rolls the highest number begins the game. The player who rolls the lowest number is the Pharisee and asks questions of the rest of the players (if you're only playing one game, the leader can be the Pharisee so all students can compete). If two people roll the highest (or lowest) number, they need to roll again until one person rolls a higher (or lower) number.
- 2) All players place their games pieces at the designated starting point (if you're using colored pencils, each player draws a dot of his or her color at the starting point.)
- 3) The Pharisee takes the "From Bethany to the Temple" handout (or whichever handout the leader provides in future games) and will be responsible for asking players questions during the game; he or she will not play the game.
- 4) The player with the highest number then rolls the die again.
 - a) If the player rolls a 1, 2, or 3, the Pharisee asks him or her any question from the handout. If the player answers correctly, he or she moves his or her game piece three spaces (or draws a line three spaces on the game board in the appropriate color). If the player answers incorrectly, he or she doesn't move his or her piece. This player may look up the correct answer in the Bible in case the Pharisee asks the question again.
 - b) If the player rolls a 4, 5, or 6, he or she moves his or her game piece (or draws a line) one space (this player doesn't have to answer any questions).
- 5) Then the person to the first player's left goes, and play proceeds clockwise around the game board.
- 6) If the Pharisee asks all the questions on the handout before the game is over, he or she asks the questions again.
- 7) The winner is the player who reaches the end first.





From Bethany to the Temple...

As a Pharisee, you are an expert and teacher in Scripture. During the game, you'll ask one of the following questions each time a player rolls a 1, 2, or 3. The answer to each question is in italics after the question, as is the Bible reference for that answer. Answers are from Luke or Zechariah.

- 1) When Jesus went to Jerusalem, from where did he walk? *Bethphage or Bethany (Luke 19:29)*.
- 2) What was unusual about the colt Jesus rode into Jerusalem? *It had never been ridden* (*Luke 19:30*).
- 3) What did the colt's owner ask the disciples? "Why are you untying our colt?" (Luke 19:33).
- 4) What was laid on the colt before Jesus sat on it? The disciples' garments (Luke 19:35).
- 5) What did the people put on the road as Jesus rode by? *Their cloaks and branches (Luke 19:36).*
- 6) What did the followers do as they walked with Jesus? *Shout, sing, praise God (Luke 19:37).*
- 7) What did the people say when Jesus arrived? "Bless the king who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Luke 19:38).
- 8) Why were the Pharisees upset during Jesus's entry into Jerusalem? *They did not like what the crowd was saying (Luke 19:39).*
- 9) What did Jesus say would burst into cheers if the crowd stopped praising him? *The stones along the road (Luke 19:40).*
- 10) What did Zechariah prophesy the people would do when Jesus entered Jerusalem? *Rejoice* (*Zechariah 9:9*).
- 11) Who did Zechariah say would come into town? Jerusalem's king (Zechariah 9:9).
- 12) How did Zechariah describe the characteristics of this coming king? *Victorious, humble, and riding on a donkey (Zechariah 9:9).*
- 13) What did Jesus do in the Temple? Drove out merchants (Luke 19:45).
- 14) What did Jesus say the Temple should be? A place of prayer (Luke 19:46).
- 15) What did Jesus do daily? Taught in the Temple (Luke 19:47).
- 16) How did the people respond to Jesus's teaching? They listened to every word (Luke 19:48).





- 1) What did Jesus tell the disciples to do in the garden? *Pray (Luke 22:40)*.
- 2) What does Jesus ask of God? "Please take this cup of suffering away from me" (Luke 22:42).
- 3) How did Jesus end his prayer? By saying, "Yet I want your will, not mine" (Luke 22:42).
- 4) What were the disciples doing when Jesus returned to them? *Sleeping (Luke 22:42).*
- 5) Why did Jesus tell the disciples to pray? So temptation would not overpower them (Luke 22:46).
- 6) Who betrayed Jesus with a kiss? *Judas (Luke 22:47)*.
- 7) Where did the leaders take Jesus after they arrested him? *To the high priest's house (Luke 22:54).*
- 8) What did Peter say when a servant girl accused him of being Jesus's disciple? "*I don't even know the man*" (*Luke 22:57*).
- 9) What happened after the third time Peter denied knowing Christ? *The rooster crowed* (*Luke 22:60*).
- 10) Who attended the high council meeting to convict Jesus? *The leading priests and teachers of religious law (Luke 22:66).*
- 11) What statement did they want Jesus to respond to? "Tell us if you are the Messiah" (Luke 22:67).
- 12) Where did Jesus say he would soon be sitting? *At God's right hand in the place of power* (*Luke 22:69*).
- 13) Who was Pilate? *The Roman governor (Luke 23:1).*
- 14) What did the council accuse Jesus of doing? *Telling them not to pay taxes and claiming to be the Messiah, a king (Luke 23:2).*



- 15) Why did Pilate send Jesus to Herod? Jesus was from Galilee, Herod's jurisdiction (Luke 23:6-7).

- 17) What did the religious leaders do while Herod questioned Jesus? *Shouted accusations* (*Luke 23:10*).
- 18) What did Herod and the soldiers do to Jesus? *They mocked, ridiculed, and put a robe on him (Luke 23:11).*
- 19) What happened to Herod and Pilate that day? *They became friends (Luke 23:12).*
- 20) Why did Pilate want to release Jesus? Because he found Jesus innocent (Luke 23:14).
- 21) Who did Pilate release instead of Jesus? Barabbas (Luke 23:25).
- 22) Why did Jesus ask God to forgive the people? *Because they didn't know what they were doing* (*Luke 23:34*).
- 23) What did the sign on the cross say? "This is the King of the Jews" (Luke 23:38).
- 24) What did the Roman soldier say about Jesus after Jesus had died? "Surely this man was innocent" (Luke 23:47).
- 25) Who stood at a distance watching? Jesus's friends (Luke 23:49).
- 26) Who asked for permission to bury Jesus? *Joseph of Arimathea, a member of the Jewish high council* (*Luke 23:50-52*).
- 27) Why didn't the women bring their embalming spices to the tomb right away? *Because by the time they had finished preparing the spices, it was the Sabbath, the time to rest (Luke 24:55-56).*

If you've asked all the questions before the players have finished the game, start asking questions from the beginning again.

The Death of the King

Luke 22:66–23:56 (adapted from the NRSV)

READER ONE:	When day came, the chief priests and scribes gathered together, and they brought Jesus to their council.
READER TWO:	They said, "If you are the Messiah, tell us." Jesus replied,
READER THREE:	"If I tell you, you will not believe; and if I question you, you will not answer. But from now on the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the power of God."
READER ONE:	All of them asked,
READER TWO:	"Are you, then, the Son of God?"
READER THREE:	"You say that I am."
READER TWO:	Then they said, "What further testimony do we need? We have heard it ourselves from his own lips!"
READER ONE:	Then the assembly rose as a body and brought Jesus before Pilate. They began to accuse him, saying,
READER TWO:	"We found this man perverting our nation, forbidding us to pay taxes to the emperor, and saying that he himself is the Messiah, a king."
READER ONE:	Then Pilate asked Jesus,
READER FOUR:	"Are you the king of the Jews?"
READER THREE:	"You say so."
READER ONE:	Then Pilate said to the chief priests and the crowds,
READER FOUR:	"I find no basis for an accusation against this man."

READER TWO:	"He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee where he began even to this place."
READER EIGHT:	When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. And when he learned that Jesus was under Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time.
READER FIVE:	When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had been wanting to see him for a long time, because he had heard about him and was hoping to see him perform some sign.
READER SEVEN:	He questioned him at some length, but Jesus gave him no answer.
READER SIX:	The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him. Even Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt and mocked him; then he put an elegant robe on him, and sent him back to Pilate.
READER FIVE:	That same day Herod and Pilate became friends; before this they had been enemies.
READER ONE:	Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and said to them,
READER FOUR:	"You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people, and here I have examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him."
ALL (except READERS THREE and FOUR): "Away with this man! Release Barabbas for us!"	


READER FIVE:	Barabbas had been put in prison for an insurrection that had taken place in the city, and for murder.

READER ONE:	A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said,

Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

Then he took it down, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid. It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning.
READER SEVEN:	The women who had come with Jesus from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they went home, and prepared spices and perfumes.
READER ONE:	On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment.

Contributions by African American Churches

History. The first African American churches to be a part of the Covenant Church were Oakdale Covenant Church in Chicago, Illinois, pastored by the Rev. Willie Jemison and Grace Covenant Church in Compton, California, pastored by the Rev. Robert Dawson. Oakdale transitioned from a predominately white congregation to a predominately black congregation during the 1960s with Pastor Jemison arriving in 1970 as the congregation's first black pastor. Grace became part of the Covenant in 1969. Other early churches included Community Covenant, Calumet Park, Illinois, pastored by the Rev. Donald Davenport, Gospel Way Covenant, Chicago, Illinois, pastored by the Rev. Bill Watts, and Fellowship Covenant, Bronx, New York, pastored by the Rev. Jerry Mosby. Since those early days, the number of African American congregations has grown substantially. Growth was slow at first, but has now continued to increase steadily. This is due in large part to a change in the denomination's stance from reacting to changing communities, to actively seeking to be ethnically inclusive. **Discuss: How can you and your church be more proactive in achieving ethnic inclusiveness?**

Contributions. The denomination often turns to black leaders to lead the way in the areas of justice and righteousness, developing sensitivity to diversity and worship. African American churches have helped create a deeper appreciation of the diversity of Christ's Church, an atmosphere of freedom expressed in worship, and a new freedom for the church to be more expressive and accepting of differences. African American churches give leadership to the denomination in being proactive on issues of justice within the larger community. **Discuss: What are some issues of injustice you are familiar with and how could the church actively respond to them?**

Opportunities and Challenges for the Future. There is still a struggle within the denomination to be fully sensitive to ethnic and cultural issues. But there is openness and willingness. There is a great opportunity for the face of the Covenant to look more like the kingdom of God. The denomination now faces a challenge—how will the church's organization, leadership, institutions, and denominational gatherings reflect our celebration of diversity? **Discuss: How do you think the growing diversity of our denomination should be reflected in our leadership, churches, and institutions**?

Contributions by Hispanic Churches

Theological Contribution. We understand that the kingdom of God is not a reality to be delayed until the complete realization of the coming era, but a reality that encourages us to live in a full way on this earth. Our hope is not placed on economy or prosperity, therefore, but in Jesus Christ who helps us to live the gospel in the midst of the needs, poverty, and suffering of our peoples. **Discuss: Is this theological perspective different from that of many middle-class Anglos?**

Diversity. Having different Hispanic cultures, our presence adds practical ways of living with people from other backgrounds. Patience in the midst of the differences and appreciation of different styles of relating to God gives the church the opportunity to see God as the God of many peoples. The presence of Covenant Hispanic churches makes it a reality that the church is universal and not the church of just one ethnic group. **Discuss: Why is this important?**

Worship. The Hispanic culture empowers a sense of variety to worship God. Each situation we have to face promotes us to sing a new song to our Lord. Our choruses are not mere repetitive words, but continued affirmations of our trust in God's word and in the Lord himself. As did the psalmists, we sing songs in the midst of our reality, bringing the presence of God to that reality. **Discuss: Does the worship in your church reflect an appreciation for the cultures and age groups in your community?**

Community Life. The sense of community is a vital aspect of the Hispanics. We bring our neighbors and our families to worship God and we bring them to our homes. We grow up in our faith with others, not alone; therefore, we share our faith with no fear of invading the privacy of the other. We evangelize family and friends and we evangelize people that are not Christians. Our faith is communicated in our homes, on the streets, in supermarkets, and at work without any restrictions. We pray together, we suffer together, we enjoy together, and we cry together. **Discuss: How is your church's community life similar or different from that mentioned above?**

Contributions by Asian Churches

Who are Asian Americans? The Asian-American Christian community is shaped by its experience as an immigrant community. The overwhelming majority of Asian immigration to the United States occurred after 1965 when the quota system that had limited immigrants from Asian nations was repealed. The large majority of the Asian-Americans are new to the nation and, therefore, relatively new to the Covenant. Most Asian-Americans are either first generation immigrants or second generation ethnics. **Discuss: What is the difference between immigrants and ethnics?**

The Asian-American population covers a wide range of people groups and languages. While they share a continent of origin, significant differences exist between East Asians (such as Chinese, Korean), Southeast Asians (such as Vietnamese, Cambodian), South Asians (such as Indian, Pakistani), and including Central Asians and Near East Asians. **Discuss: Where do you see the influence of Asian-Americans in your community and in your world?**

Two Generations. The Asian-American community has been undergoing a shift from the first generation immigrant church to the second generation ethnic community. The immigrant generation started ethnic specific immigrant churches out of the need to have worship and community in their own language and reflecting their home culture. As immigrants, first generation Asian Americans could only rely upon God and their church community to meet all their needs. This deepened their Christian faith and prayer life.

Second generation Asian-American Christians continue to work through their identity as an ethnic people group. The spirituality of the second generation is shaped by its bi-lingual and bi-cultural nature. As Evangelicalism confronts a changing demographic and cultural context, bi-cultural Christians (such as Asian-Americans) provide a spiritual insight and experience that will aid Christianity in navigating these cultural shifts. **Discuss: What problems would be important to address between these two generations? Why is it important to pay attention to cultural shifts?**

Contributions. Bi-cultural ethnic minorities have an ethos and a worldview that broadens how we view spiritual life. Asian-American Christians understand spirituality in the context of suffering and the passionate prayer life that corresponds to such suffering. Asian-American Christians understand the centrality of community in spiritual life as the church became the center of social and spiritual life for the recent immigrant. And Asian-American Christians understand the process of journeying through two different cultural worlds – yielding a spirituality that is both profound in its depth of experience and reflective in its understanding of cultural dynamics. **Discuss: What would it be like to "journey between two different cultural worlds?" What is your world view of the Kingdom of God? What has or can your church learn from Asian-American Christians?**
