NEW PROJECTS PROMOTE COMMUNITY TRANSFORMATION

ovenant World Relief has six new projects: mobile medical clinics in Burma, education and community development in East Asia, agricultural training and support in Ecuador, agriculture in Haiti, education for refugees in Kenya, and education in Thailand.

Mobile medical clinics in Burma provide basic medical care and disease prevention to the Karen people who are facing severe persecution. The Karen people are internally displaced people (IDPs), a type of refugee.

In East Asia, we are partnering to train young people in community development principles. As they are learning best practices, they will also be doing practical projects in their local area.

Deforestation and the use of harsh pesticides has plagued the Pacto Sumaco community of Ecuador because of their dependence on growing naranjilla. This new project will equip them to grow mushrooms that do not need pesticides. This will improve health for the entire community as well as provide a more stable source of income.

In Fond-des-Blancs, Haiti, a new project will create an environment that enables farmers to quadruple their current harvest without re-inventing their traditional crop productions. They will benefit from advanced technology, improved irrigation, quality seed, marketing and technical support.

In Kenya we are continuing the education project for Congolese refugees in partnership with the Evangelical Covenant Church of Kenya. The number of Congolese refugees continues to increase, and those who are already enrolled in the program have greatly benefited.

Community leaders in northern Thailand have approached our partner, the Sustainable Research Development Foundation, and asked for help in providing quality education for children. These children have been very susceptible to sweat shops, factories, the commercial sex industry and human trafficking. A new residential tutorial learning center will provide after-school and weekend learning opportunities for 32 students as well as additional opportunities for children in the community.

JAPAN DISASTER RESPONSE

For all of our nearly 25 years living in Japan we heard, "someday the big one is coming." My children had monthly earthquake drills in their schools. Every September 1 the Japanese commemorate the 1923 earthquake in the Tokyo area when 140,000 people were killed. They use this day to carry out disaster relief drills expecting that the big one would be coming. On March 11 it came and was bigger than anyone expected. We are thankful to be able to partner with the Japan Covenant Church and others carrying out relief work among the most vulnerable in northeast Japan. We are also thankful to all of you who are so generously giving to support the relief efforts.

HAITI

More than one year after the devastating earthquake in Haiti, our response has moved beyond relief to recovery and long-term community development. Covenant World Relief is now moving forward with partners in three key areas: agricultural development with World Relief, training Haitian medical personnel and improving medical delivery systems with Medical Teams International (MTI), and long-term housing solutions with Habitat for Humanity. Two separate teams of ECC medical volunteers have worked with MTI at a new clinic, partially funded by CWR, in a community called Canaan. Through these partnerships and others, CWR will be engaged in long-term development in Haiti for years to come.

THE IMPORTANCE OF WOMEN'S

EMPOWERMENT

he UN has said that women do twothirds of the world's work, produce half of its food yet earn only 10% of its income and own 1% of its property. Studies also show that when women are empowered, their families benefit and ultimately the entire community is improved. Their families become healthier, more children go to school, agricultural productivity improves and income increases.

Covenant World Relief is deeply committed to empowering women and many of our projects focus on supporting and empowering women.

- In Bangladesh, families are benefitting from new clean water systems. When women do not have to spend as much time on daily tasks (cooking, cleaning, household chores), they are freed to pursue education and to work outside of the home.
- Mother and infant mortality rates in Burma among the Karen people are strikingly high. The mobile medical clinics provide emergency and on-going medical care to these vulnerable women and children.
- Several women's agricultural training and support groups have been formed in the Central African Republic.
- The Colombia egg project provides a fresh start and an education for young women who have struggled with substance abuse.

- The Colombia education project provides foundational pre-school education. While the children are in school parents are freed to work or search for work.
- Five of our current projects in India are solely focused on empowering women through micro-finance and other means.
- In Kenya, Congolese refugees are receiving education, a key component of empowerment.
- The Togo fistula project provides fistula surgery and training, loans, and microenterprise support.
- Teenagers in Vietnam are given apprenticeships in a field of their choice to break the cycle of poverty.
