However, when addressing extreme poverty and injustice, it is through long-term engagement in community development programs that individuals, families, and communities are truly transformed.

Transformation is the change from existence contrary to God's purposes to life in full harmony with God and others.* Transformation is ultimately the work of God and all of us are in need of God's transforming work in our lives.

Partnership is foundational to CWR. First, we recognize the vital importance of partnering with God, as God is the only one who can bring about true transformation. Without joining God, our work would be fruitless. Second, CWR partners with highly capable, time-tested, and trustworthy organizations, most of which are based locally and are a part of the local community. WOMEN GROWING OUT OF POVERTY

aren, Sharon, and Domtilla are three women who are participating in the CWR Jitokeze agriculture project. This project empowers women in rural western Kenya, giving them stable sources of income and food security.

Women in this community are beautiful and strong; faithful and nurturing. They have diverse capabilities and amazing potential. However, these women have been marginalized because of their gender, the recent severe drought, and conflict. They are being trained to grow drought resistant crops, engage in agroforestry, and breed chickens. Through this



training, the agriculuture project provides them with increased income.

They now have access to the resources they need to provide for their families. Your gifts to CWR are helping these women rise out of poverty and stand on their own two feet.

HOPE FOR THE MOST VULNERABLE



avid Pur is a beneficiary of the Vulnerable and Orphaned Children project in South Sudan. David's father was killed by a landmine in 2003. His mother, Nyandit, who has a physical disability caused by a bone disease, is the one taking care of David.

CWR's project has provided David with basic health care and has also allowed

his mother to receive vocational training. Nyandit has been trained in sewing and tailoring and is now able to design clothes. She is selling them and making a living wage in order to support David and her whole family.

This year CWR is partnering in 45 community development projects and has responded to disasters in 16 countries.

MS. TSHANGASE

s. Tshangase is a single mother of two in South Africa. Her house was falling apart and she barely made enough money to survive and care for her children. She joined a self-help group with our partner Zimele. Through this group, she has received a small loan and the encouragement to grow her craft business. Her business has grown enough now that she has repaid the loan so another woman can borrow the money for her own business. She is building a new house since her previous home was beyond repair.

KIDS HELPING KIDS: INDIA

his year our annual children's discipleship and giving project, previously known as the Children's Service Project, is focusing on the children of India. Kids Helping Kids provides children in your church with the opportunity to:

- serve God and others;
- · develop a bigger view of God's kingdom;
- · connect with children from India through their stories; and
- help to meet some of the basic needs of children living in poverty.

By praying and donating to a weekly monetary offering (rather than collecting and sending items), children in North America can provide children in India with tangible items such as:

- Bed nets (\$10 each)
- Blankets (\$10 each)
- Health services (\$14 per child)
- HIV/AIDS treatment and counseling (\$200 per child)
- Identify, rescue, and rehabilitate children from slavery (\$25 per child)
- Mid-day meals (\$18 per month)
- School costs (\$20 per month)



One of the best parts of the Kids Helping Kids project is its two-way nature. Children in India aren't the only beneficiaries; we also benefit from the project when we learn about the world through the stories of children in India. The change in name from Children's Service Project to Kids Helping Kids reminds us that we are changed by this project just as the children in India are.

FROM TRASH TO THE TREASURE OF EDUCATION

while education is something that we often taken for granted in North America, an unfortunate reality for many children living in the urban slums of Bangkok is that they may not have the necessary means to complete their education. Many must drop out of school in order to help support their families.



Through CWR's partnership with the Thailand Faith and Music Foundation, a ministry of the Thailand Covenant Church, young people from three slums in Bangkok are participating in a recycling program and the profits from selling the recycled materials are then saved to pay for their education.


Through this project, the children's and teens' earnings are matched so that they may save up even more to pay for school, books, supplies, and uniforms. Our partner says, "The desired outcome would be that people would feel empowered to

make a difference in their own lives and in the lives of those in the slum. We want them to make an investment in their education and see that they can make a difference in caring for the environment by making use of something that others throw away."
