#1 | BEGINNING POINTS

Introduction

- Welcome participants back to The Meaning of Membership: Deeper in Christ. Further in Mission. Together.
- EXPLAIN: The objectives for this session are to:

 Examine the Evangelical Covenant Church (ECC), including:
 - History
 - Distinctives and theology
 - Structure and resources

Family Name Discussion

Explore how the ethos of the ECC finds expression in your local church.

Pray

EXPLAIN: Pair off and tell your partner what you know about your family name. [After several minutes, call the group back together.]

EXPLAIN: Just as each of us comes from a larger family, so our congregation is part of a larger family which has a family name, the Evangelical Covenant Church, or the Covenant. We want to introduce you to our extended family and help you see how we relate to our larger church as responsible family members.

Instruct and Interact

MISSION OF THE ECC: INTRODUCTION

A Denomination

EXPLAIN: The word "denomination" has become difficult for some people in our culture. It is true that denominations are not specifically taught in Scripture. However, we do see in Scripture that God placed people into tribes, so it's possible for us to study denominations in those terms. In essence, denominations are groups of local churches who collectively work together to fulfill God's mission in the world.

Let's take a look at the mission of the ECC.

The Ethos of the ECC—"Mission Friends"

EXPLAIN: The term "mission friends" was an early nickname given to Covenant people. From the beginning Covenanters have sought to build a culture of friendship in Christ, pursuing the mission of God together. We hope to embody that same spirit today in this congregation.

We know that we can accomplish far more by joining a missional movement with others than we could ever accomplish on our own. We are a people who are "in it together," joining God and each other to fulfill God's mission in the world.

The Covenant Describes Itself

"The Covenant is not a church organization in the ordinary sense, but a mission society having churches as its members. These churches have consolidated together because of the missionary spirit which led them to missionary enterprises too large for any single church to undertake."

—The Covenant's description of itself from the 1893 World's Fair

EXPLAIN: From our inception the Evangelical Covenant Church has been in it together to see

...more disciples
...among more populations
...in a more caring and just world.

From the beginning Covenanters have sought to build a culture of friendship in Christ. When we describe a person, we may describe them physically so that you would recognize him or her when they walked into the room. Or, we might describe their character so you would know their heart as you interact with them. We will describe the ECC in both ways.

Physical Description: Quick Facts

EXPLAIN:

- The ECC was founded in 1885 by Scandinavian immigrants.
- The ECC consists of more than 850 congregations in many locations of the U.S. and Canada.
- The ECC is comprised of 11 regions called conferences.
- The ECC is one of the fastest-growing denominations.
- The ECC is diverse—33% of our congregations are predominantly non-white or multiethnic in their makeup.
- The ECC has mission partnerships around the globe in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, Middle East North Africa, extending the whole gospel around the world and impacting hundreds of thousands of people.
- The denominational offices of the ECC are located in Chicago.

Reflection

EXPLAIN: Before we examine the character of the ECC, let's take a few moments to think about the benefits of a denomination.

[Allow a few moments for thought, then facilitate and record answers. You may wish to start in pairs before recording responses from the whole group.]

MISSION OF THE ECC: OUR ROOTS

EXPLAIN: Now that we have reflected on some of the benefits of being a denomination, let's look at how our roots have shaped our identity.

Character Description: The Identity Question

EXPLAIN: What is at the heart of the ECC? What makes the Covenant the Covenant?

The ECC has held four enduring commitments from the beginning. To understand the ECC, it is important to understand these commitments. If you remove any of them, you misunderstand the character of the Covenant.

The Enduring Commitments of the Covenant

The question often asked in Mission Friend circles was, "Are you yet walking with Christ?"

Historical Influences

EXPLAIN:

- The Protestant Reformation: A movement in Europe in the early 16th century that began with Martin Luther, who attempted to reform the Roman Catholic Church. The Reformation's influence on the Covenant can be seen our belief in the Scriptures, the Old and New Testament, as the only perfect rule for faith, doctrine, and conduct. Especially important is the belief that we are saved by God's grace alone, through faith alone, not by anything we can do.
- Pietism: A renewal movement within Lutheranism in the late 17th and mid-18th centuries that focused on individual piety (devotion) and dynamic and personal Christian life. The movement sought to restore the life of the Church through small group study of the Bible and devotional literature (called conventicles), emphasis on the priesthood of all believers, kind treatment for all people, including non-believers, and prominent devotional life in schools for theological training. To reflect these priorities, the question often asked in Mission Friend circles was, "Are you yet walking with Christ?"

- Moravian Mission: A movement that spanned the ninth century through the 1700s, which emphasized the joy of life in Christ and mission to those who did not yet know such joy. Moravians also emphasized the unity of all Christians.
- Founding Rationale: Among several different Swedish American churches in the late 19th century, the Covenant emerged as a movement of like-minded congregations who wanted to join together in common mission without rigid structures that might stifle the free movement of the Holy Spirit. One of the early markers was a distinct view of the atonement.

LEADER TIP: One Body, Many Members, by Covenant historian Philip J. Continuing Influences on the Evangelical Covenant Church Today

- The Evangelical Movement. A series of religious awakenings flowered in Europe and America during the 19th century and provided rich soil for the early growth of the Covenant Church with our passion for mission. Historically evangelicals have been characterized by their insistence on biblical authority, the necessity of new birth, Christ's mandate to evangelize the world, the continuing need for education and formation in a Christian context, and a responsibility for benevolence and the advancement of social justice.
- The Global and Multiethnic Kingdom of God. The Evangelical Covenant Church has always been an immigrant church. Although it began with Swedish immigrants, today people from many cultures and nationalities make up the Covenant Church, expanding our spiritual heritage. Whereas 100 years ago one would have heard Swedish spoken in Covenant congregations in the United States and Canada, today you might hear Spanish, Korean, or Nuer in addition to English. Covenanters now trace their roots to Africa, Asia, Europe, and North and South America. We are united in one body by our faith in Christ, and throughout our history we have continued to hold fast to the commitments that shape our character.

COVENANT AFFIRMATIONS

EXPLAIN: The Covenant's essential beliefs are summed up in six affirmations.

- We affirm the centrality of the word of God.
- We affirm the necessity of the new birth.
- We affirm a conscious dependence on the Holy Spirit.
- We affirm a commitment to the whole mission of the church.
- We affirm the church as a fellowship of believers.
- We affirm the reality of freedom in Christ.

Affirmation #1: The Centrality of the Word of God

We are people of the Book. Our first affirmation is the centrality of the word of God.

Ask participants to read this paragraph from the participant's guide:

As we read in the brochure What Does the Covenant Church Believe? A Brief Look at Covenant Affirmations:

We affirm the centrality of the word of God. We believe the Bible is the only perfect rule for faith, doctrine, and conduct. The dynamic, transforming power of the word of God directs the church in the life of each Christian. This reliance on the Bible leads us to affirm both men and women as ordained ministers and at every level of leadership. It is the reason we pursue ethnic diversity in our church and is the inspiration for every act of compassion, mercy, and justice.

"All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (2 TIMOTHY 3:16).

See also PSALM 19:7-11; HEBREWS 4:12; ISAIAH 55:11.

Reflection:

- 1) How have you seen this belief in the centrality of Scripture lived out in our church?
- 2) How does God's word influence your life?

Affirmation #2: The Necessity of New Birth

EXPLAIN: We believe that God desires a personal relationship with us. This is expressed in the affirmation of the necessity of the new birth.

We affirm the necessity of new birth, which means committing ourselves to Christ and receiving forgiveness, acceptance, and eternal life.

Ask participants to read this paragraph from the participant's guide:

We affirm the necessity of the new birth. The apostle Paul wrote, "If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come" (2 CORINTHIANS 5:17, NIV). New birth in Christ means committing ourselves to Christ and receiving forgiveness, acceptance, and eternal life. It means being alive in Christ, and this life has the qualities of love and righteousness joy and peace. New birth is only the beginning. Growing to maturity in Christ is a lifelong process for both individuals and community believers. God forms and transforms us, and it is through people transformed by Christ that God transforms the world. —What Does the Covenant Church Believe?

Affirmation #3: A Conscious Dependence on the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit animates us to go deeper in Christ.

Ask participants to read this paragraph from the participant's guide:

We affirm a conscious dependence on the Holy Spirit. The Covenant Church affirms the Trinitarian understanding of one God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The New Testament tells us that the Holy Spirit works both within individuals and among them. We believe it is the Holy Spirit who instills in our hearts a desire to turn to Christ, and who assures us that Christ dwells within us. It is the Holy Spirit who enables our obedience to Christ and conforms us to his image, and it is this Spirit in us that enables us to continue Christ's mission in the world. The Holy Spirit gives spiritual gifts to us as individuals and binds us together as Christ's body. —What Does the Covenant Church Believe?

EXPLAIN: The apostle Paul writes:

"I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God." —EPHESIANS 3:16-19, NIV

Reflection:

- 1) How have you seen our beliefs in the necessity of new birth and our conscious dependence on the Holy Spirit lived out at our church?
- 2) How are you going deeper in Christ in your own life?

Affirmation #4: A Commitment to the Whole Mission of the Church

EXPLAIN: We have always been a missional people. From the very beginning, we have recognized God's gracious invitation to join in the mission. As a result, we affirm our commitment to the whole mission of the church.

Ask participants to read this paragraph from the participant's guide:

We affirm a commitment to the whole mission of the church. The early Covenanters were known as "mission friends," people of shared faith who came together to carry out God's mission both far and near. Mission for them and for us includes evangelism, Christian formation, and ministries of compassion, mercy, and justice. We follow Christ's two central calls: the Great Commission sends us out into all the world to make disciples, and the Great Commandment calls us to love the Lord our God and our neighbors as ourselves. —What Does the Covenant Church Believe?

EXPLAIN: God's word speaks to this call on our lives as believers.

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." —ACTS 1:8

"He has shown all you people what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." —Micah 6:8

See also: COLOSSIANS 1:28; MATTHEW 10:39.

Reflection:

- 1) How have you seen us being missional at our church?
- 2) How do you see the church helping you to reach the lost, help the hurting, and address the causes of that hurt?

Affirmation #5: The Church as a Fellowship of Believers

EXPLAIN: We are people who go deeper in Christ and further in God's mission together.

Ask participants to read this paragraph from the participant's guide:

We affirm the church as a fellowship of believers. Membership in the Covenant Church is by confession of personal faith in Jesus Christ and is open to all believers. We observe baptism and Holy Communion as sacraments commanded by Jesus. We practice both infant and believer

baptism. We believe in the priesthood of all believers, that is, we all share in the ministry of the church. We also affirm that God calls some men and women into professional, full-time ministry. The church is not an institution, organization, or building. It is a grace-filled fellowship of believers who participate in the life and mission of Jesus Christ. It is a family of equals: as the New Testament teaches that within Christian community there is to be neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, but all are one in Christ Jesus (GALATIANS 3:28). —What Does the Covenant Church Believe?

EXPLAIN: The Bible tells us how the early members of the Church behaved:

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved." —ACTS 2:42-47

See also EPHESIANS 4:11-16; HEBREWS 10:24-25.

Affirmation #6: The Reality of Freedom in Christ

EXPLAIN: The final affirmation speaks to the grace we extend to others in order to live in unity as a church.

We affirm the reality of freedom in Christ. The apostle Paul wrote, "It is for freedom that Christ has set us free" (Galatians 5:1, NIV). This freedom is a gift of God in Christ, and it manifests itself in a right relationship with God and others. It is not a private gift to be used selfishly but is given to serve the community and the world. For Paul, this freedom means we are set free from the power of those things that on their own tend to divide. United in Christ, we offer freedom to one another to differ on issues of belief or practice where the biblical and historical record seems to allow for a variety of interpretations of the will and purposes of God. We in the Covenant Church seek to focus on what unites us as followers of Christ, rather than on what divides us. —What Does the Covenant Church Believe?

This freedom means we are set free from the power of those things that on their own tend to divide.

Reflection:

- 1) How have you seen us being connectional at our church?
- 2) In what ways does our faith flourish when we embrace and extend freedom in Christ?

COVENANT MISSION PRIORITIES

EXPLAIN: ECC churches partner together through five mission priorities. Each of these mission priorities is strengthened by ministry leadership from Covenant Offices (Chicago, IL).

- Start and Strengthen Churches: The Covenant is committed to start and strengthen healthy, missional churches, much as the Apostle Paul started and continued to strengthen churches in the New Testament. We believe the local church is God's foundational strategy to carry out mission in the world. Through planting new churches and providing resources to strengthen existing congregations, these ministries seek to reach more people, in more places, among more populations, with the hope of Christ.
- Make and Deepen Disciples: The denomination partners with regional conferences to resource local churches to provide intentional pathways for persons of all ages to follow Jesus, grow toward Christ-likeness, and join in God's mission. Our dream is to have an exponential impact by equipping the Covenant to become a multiethnic community of disciples who make disciples among all ages.
- Love Mercy Do Justice: From our inception the Covenant has been concerned with helping hurting people (love mercy) and addressing the causes of that hurt (do justice). The mission of Love Mercy Do Justice (LMDJ) is to "Join God in making things right in our broken world." The goal of LMDJ is to resource and equip the local church in its call to love, serve, and work together with people at the margins toward holistic individual, family, and community transformation.
- Develop Leaders: The Covenant is committed to developing leaders.
 It is our privilege to strengthen our Covenant community of vocational ministers through advocacy, endorsement, care, and formation.
 Additionally, we strive to lift up lay leaders in our local churches to join with local pastors in furthering God's mission.
- **Serve Globally:** The Covenant is committed to God's global mission. Through global partnerships and Covenant missionary personnel, we make and deepen disciples, start and strengthen churches, develop

leaders, love mercy and do justice, and serve globally—that is, we join the rest of the global church in engaging in God's mission.

COVENANT DISTINCTIVES

EXPLAIN: Our Covenant affirmations make clear the values and principles that have guided us from generation to generation, shaping over time a set of key distinctives that set us apart from other church movements.

- 1) We are evangelical but not exclusive.
- 2) We are biblical but not doctrinaire.
- 3) We are congregational but not independent.
- 4) We are traditional but not rigid.

COVENANT PRACTICES

Some additional practices that shape our life together in the Evangelical Covenant Church are:

• The Sacrament of Baptism. The ECC celebrates the sacrament of baptism as commanded by Jesus in Matthew 28:19-20, and we affirm both infant and believer baptism. While the denomination has traditionally practiced the baptism of infants, in conformity with our affirmation of freedom in Christ, we also recognize the practice of believer baptism and do not consider mode of baptism a cause for division.

- Multiethnic Commitment. The ECC strives to be an intentionally multiethnic church, taking seriously both the mission of Christ and the unity of Christ's Church. These two convictions converge at the point of pressing forward in ethnic ministry and diversity. Currently, the ECC is one of the most multiethnic denominations in North America. A sixfold multi-dimensional test has therefore been adopted to intentionally foster the advancement of our multiethnic mosaic throughout our movement. Together, the ECC strives to make multiethnic progress in the six dimensions of: 1) Population, 2) Participation, 3) Power, 4) Pacesetting, 5) Purposeful Narrative, and 6) Practicing Solidarity. - Women in Ministry Leadership. The ECC has long affirmed the full participation of women in all ministries of the church, and in 1976 delegates to the Annual Meeting voted to begin ordaining women in the Covenant Church. Since that time, women have served in all levels of ministry and leadership positions within the church. The ECC upholds that the biblical basis for service in the body of Christ is giftedness, a call from God, and godly character—not gender. Our position on women in ministry flows from our high view of Scripture and is not derived from cultural or societal trends. We believe women ought to minister not because culture or society says so, but because the Bible leads the Church to such a conclusion.

- Marriage Practice and Human Sexuality. We recognize that God's love meets us without preconditions, God's grace leads us into newness of life, and God's ongoing work in our lives empowers us for costly discipleship toward holiness and service. We affirm that God's boundaries, whatever the dimension of life, are meant for our flourishing. With regard to marital practice and human sexuality, the biblically derived core of the Covenant position is: "Faithfulness in heterosexual marriage, celibacy in singleness—these constitute the Christian standard."* Therefore, in ECC churches, marriages are performed between one man and one woman. The ECC offers pastoral care to anyone regardless of race, gender, creed, ethnic origin, socioeconomic

status, or sexual orientation. The ECC is also committed to equipping people to flourish in love for LGBTQ+/SSA/sexual minority individuals and communities.

The purpose of *The Meaning of Membership: Deeper in Christ.*Further in Mission. Together. resource is to identify what it means for individuals to become members of an Evangelical Covenant Church. Membership is a commitment to grow deeper in Christ and further in mission together.

The Meaning of Membership covers:
