## The Work of the Kingdom

I recently traveled with leaders from Serve Globally to Ethiopia to visit our sister Covenant denomination and long-time CWRD partner, the Evangelical Covenant Church of South Sudan and Ethiopia (ECCSSE). We were warmly welcomed with generous hospitality and exuberant celebrations of singing, dancing, and heartfelt joy.

One part of this welcome stood out as especially meaningful. As we visited churches across the countryside, each congregation upheld the same tradition: after joyful greetings and music, we were seated while deaconesses removed our shoes and washed our feet.

It was beautiful, humbling—and admittedly uncomfortable. Having someone tend to your feet is an intimate

act, and I found myself restless, eager to witness the ECCSSE's remarkable community development work the reason I had come.

I also struggled with the optics: a white Western man being served by Black women. It felt at odds with my convictions around humility and mission. Shouldn't I be the one washing their feet?

But as I reflected on these moments, I realized the women of the ECCSSE were not just offering hospitality, they were offering Christ. Their act echoed John 13, where Jesus washes his disciples' feet and calls them to do the same in love.

The ECCSSE embodies that love daily: empowering widows to grow food and feed their families, training peacemakers in conflict zones, and opening doors to

education for children.

That is the work I came to see. But to truly witness it, I had to first receive. In those moments of foot washing, they took the role of Christ, and I the role of disciple. And that is a posture I am grateful to take.

#### **SHALOMUSIC**

In the neighborhood of Ciudad Bolívar, Shalomusic brings together music, sports, and psychosocial support to restore dignity and inspire youth. The project hosts instrumental training, vocal classes, peace workshops, and community sports events, all within a nurturing Christian environment. The young leaders have dreams of launching a local music store as well as reading initiatives, investing in the long-term transformation of its community-body, mind, and spirit.

#### ART-PAZ

In neighborhoods like Kennedy and Puerto López, ART-PAZ uses creativity as a tool for social change. This ministry fosters dialogue, emotional healing, and leadership development. Children and teens produce stories through photography and film and mothers gain tools to launch small businesses. ART-PAZ reflects Christ's love in tangible ways that meet both emotional and physical needs.

#### **SEHPAZ**

In El Bagre, SEHPAZ is nurturing a generation of peacebuilders. The ministry engages children, youth, and families through education, arts, and spiritual formation, offering training in conflict resolution, community gardening, music, and Christian values. By empowering participants to become agents of reconciliation, SEHPAZ is addressing the roots of injustice as well as sowing hope in one of Colombia's most vulnerable regions.
