This good news is being proclaimed by Roy and Aleta Danforth in many ways, but they know they could not do what they are doing without the sacrificial giving of so many people and churches that support them in the United States.

The past year has not been an easy one for Roy and Aleta. Although the region they live in remained calm during the

worst of the fighting in CAR, the toll was still taken on their community. They have many Fulani friends, a cattle herding people, who have had to flee the country for their own

safety. They have no idea where many of their friends are or even if they are alive and safe. They recently learned of one refugee camp over an hour away in Cameroon with 8,000 people living in it. All the Fulani have left town and the Danforths now make frequent trips into Cameroon to visit and pray for these displaced people.
